Attendees will explore strategies such as how to build and nurture collaborative relationships, develop advocacy approaches that explain the role and value of the music program within the academic community, and represent the music unit in compelling ways. Attendees will consider how they as music administrators might successfully cultivate engagement with faculty, students, and staff, as well as with upper administrators, alumni, donors, and community members.

Financial management requires not only detailed knowledge of costs, but also the savvy required to advocate budget needs, the ability to allocate and manage funds effectively, and the wherewithal to exercise fiscal responsibility—while at the same time dealing with issues that range from scholarships, to facility maintenance and repair, to faculty compensation. This session will consider existing realities and focus on financial planning, both short- and long-range; budget management principles; and strategies that will assist administrators to develop and sustain positions of fiscal stability.

Music schools and departments are complex. Administrators often find themselves working across multiple units, responsible for a broad array of curricular programs, and in need of finding commonalities so that resources can be maximized while at the same time emphasizing and promoting the attributes of specific areas of study. A key factor in addressing these challenges and ensuring that complexities support, rather than constrain, institutional mission, is the role assumed by the faculty. Keen leadership abilities and skills are required to navigate these circumstances, as well as manage and direct faculty resources and address the needs of faculty members. This session will focus on approaches that can assist to create and develop cultures that stress the importance of participation and collaboration, the assumption of responsibility and ownership, and the value of establishing camaraderie and respect; as well as cultures that offer permissions which enable, and protections which safeguard, innovation. The session will also address nutsand-bolts issues such as hiring and firing; conducting annual performance reviews; promotion, tenure, and reward systems; and faculty development opportunities. A variety of situations will be presented, each followed by time for discussion.
